## Literacy Volunteers adapt to the times

Faced with a detour because of the pandemic, Literacy Volunteers just shifted gears and continued their good work.

The program—the full name is Literacy New York—Fulton, Montgomery and Schoharie Counties teaches adults reading, writing and math. Instruction is free.

Like most schools and education agencies, Literacy New York was challenged when the state locked down because of COVID-19 last March.

But also like schools, Literacy New York went to remote teaching, with volunteer tutors and students linking up weekly via computers.

"It was difficult at first and not ideal, but our tutors and students managed well," said Literacy Executive Director Lisa Cardilli.

The remote sessions lasted till July 1, when pandemic numbers dropped. Tutors and students went back to their usual practice of meeting at a neutral setting.

COVID numbers climbed again in the fall, and instruction went back to distance learning in November.

"We're planning to stay at distance until June 30, but if vaccines increase, that date could be pulled back," said Ms. Cardilli.

"We hope to go back to who we are and put distance in the past."

But even with distance learning, Literacy's been a success. Many students have landed jobs, moved up to better jobs, earned their high school equivalency diploma and gone to college.

A very few students are learning English as a second language, instruction that Literacy offers.

"Whether it's in-person or remote, Literacy has an excellent track record of improving people's lives," said Jim Poole, president of the board of directors.

"Lisa's done a great job of continuing the program through distance learning."

Ms. Cardilli has a staff of two. Linda Dearwester is the program coordinator in Fulton and Montgomery counties, and Ann Avery-Jones is an instructor in Fulton County.

The staff and volunteer tutors are working with about 80 students in the three counties, and more students are welcomed.

Potential students should call Ms. Cardilli who's based in Cobleskill, at 518-234-2576 for an in-person intake interview.

An in-person assessment follows, and that includes testing in reading and math so that the student can be placed with a tutor.

Students should have access to a computer and reliable internet, though not all do. For those without, tutors or Literacy staff will meet in person.

"We have some tutors who insist on meeting their students in person," Ms. Cardilli said. "But right now, we prefer distance for everybody's safety."

Students and tutors usually meet once a week; a student's goal may take a year.

Materials are free, as well as instruction.

The SCRABBLE tournament, Literacy Volunteers' popular fundraiser, is looking to return this fall.

Literacy held the tournament each March for more than a dozen years, but the 2020 tournament was cancelled because of COVID-19.

The traditional March date wasn't possible this year, either, but Ms. Cardilli hopes a date in the fall will work.

"We want to bring back SCRABBLE, but we want to be safe, too," she said. "It's important to us as a





In 2021, the Arboretum plans to improve the trails along the Native Plant Trail with the

addition of wooden planks in wet areas and rebuild the musical bridge. They will also be recreating the Bog Garden and will continue to plant and develop the Meditation Garden as well as landscaping along the new Emergency Shelter.

## A cafe that nourishes neighbors

To tell the truth, a little time to stay home and put my feet up didn't seem half bad.

The ache in my knees and arches from so many hours standing and moving was beginning to wear me down.

The fear of the pandemic wasn't helping matters — the constant hand-washing, the wiping down of everything, the dread that the big bad bug was going to infiltrate my family's farm and business, make my customers fall ill, make my loved ones fall ill.

That much fear in a tired body is pretty toxic.

So we agreed to close our doors to the public two weeks before the state shut down last March.

But the pain moved from my feet straight up to my heart.

In exchange for rest it felt as though we had surrendered our vocation. No. It was more than that. In exchange for rest and safety, we were surrendering our calling.

Sap Bush Hollow Farm is a business that exists to let our family members fulfill a mission: to nourish and restore family, community and planet.

When COVID-19 required that we shut our doors, I went into mourning.

Maybe my knees and my feet hurt every Saturday as we unlocked the cafe doors to get ready to make omelets from our hens' eggs, pull espresso shots from our neighbor's fresh roasted coffee beans, fry sausages and burgers made from our pigs and cattle, serve up soups and stews made with the meat and bone broth from our grassfed livestock.

But the minute my hands are lifting croissants into the proofing oven, kneading fresh bread, stirring, slicing and rolling out crusts, all pain vanishes.

My oldest daughter, Saoirse, now 17, dials in the espresso machine.

My youngest, Ula, 13, rolls silver ware, wipes down tables and brings the fresh-baked pastries up front.

My husband Bob works at the sink, keeping up with the flow of dishes.

Mom and Dad work with the weekend help to feed the livestock and monitor the pastures. Pain is forgotten.

We're growing food for our neighbors.

We're cooking food for our neighbors.

We're making the front of the house ready for them to come in the door, where they will be fed with love, where they will find companionship and connection.

The business takes care of us while we fulfill our calling to this place that we love so deeply.

I think this explains the mourning that settled over my body.

How could it be that what we felt called to do: to use our farm and cafe as a platform to build community, to help people make friends, enjoy conversation, find needed hugs and helping hands...was suddenly ...dangerous?

I cried for days, until I'd emptied my body of tears. Bob and I sat out in the woods, holding each other, staring up at budding trees against the March sky, unsure what to do next.

And then we recognized that the mission of Sap Bush Hollow Farm hadn't changed one bit.

We just had to adapt how we were fulfilling it.

In February, we launched a new podcast, "The Hearth of Sap Bush Hollow," sharing stories and essays from the farm.

We resumed production with fervor, using the recordings as a way to encourage reflection and give encouragement to all our followers as we pushed through the struggles as a nation.

We moved our farm store completely online, began sourcing allnatural groceries, then cleared out a shed at the back of the cafe parking lot and set it up with a self-serve freezer and refrigerator.

Our customers could order online, we packed groceries and meat orders and frozen foods from the cafe inside the building, then moved orders out to the shed, where customers could pick up their foods with zero contact (But we got to wave to them from across the parking lot).

Whenever we could, we picked up the telephone or jumped onto online sessions to meet them for coffee or cocktails

We read and wrote long emails

sharing details on our lives and walked customers through their home cooking questions. When it seemed safe, we lined the service area of the espresso bar with plexiglass, then opened the cafe for take-out.

When the next phase of opening allowed, we spread tables and chairs across the cafe lawn and logged mile upon mile on our feet, serving customers outdoors.

We gave them plexiglass barriers so they could sit across from each other and take in familiar smiles.

We learned to laugh at whatever changes would suddenly be required of us from week to week to week.

We used a whole lot of soap and hand sanitizer.

We admired the fortitude of our guests, determined to keep supporting us, determined to remain safe, showing up each week as the weather grew colder and colder, changing from shorts and sandals to flannel shirts and sweaters, until they were sitting outside, sipping lattes under blankets in coats, hats, winter boots, gloves and scarves.

And we followed the numbers and we looked toward winter.

It was easy enough to predict this time what was coming.

Our customers knew to expect it, too.

The week before Thanksgiving, Sap Bush Cafe closed its doors to the public once again.

All farm products, including frozen cafe soups, stews and curries, are available online with pick up at our self-serve shed.

But this time is different. We know what to do to keep

safe. We know that spring will come again.

We know that the first weekend in April, we will be able to dial in that espresso machine, bake the croissants, make the breakfast sandwiches and see our neighbors once more. Until then, we're taking some time this winter to make the most of these unprecedented times. We're watching the snowflakes, lingering over our coffee, and this time, really and truly putting our feet up. Without the fear. Stay safe, everyone. "Each day I see miracles happen, as I observe clients changing the habits, which no longer serve them, as they benefit from the services I offer. Like a 55 year-old mom of two, who lost 70 pounds after 30 years of suffering from being overweight.

"There is the dad with three young children, ages five to ten, who stopped smoking two packs of cigarettes a day, after being a smoker for 15 years...he is now smoke-free. And the woman with breast cancer, who received services to reduce stress and increase relaxation, while she was receiving chemotherapy and radiation.

# Dedicated to Iroquois culture

The Iroquois Indian Museum is an educational institution dedicated to fostering understanding of Iroquois culture using Iroquois art as a window to that culture

The Museum is a venue for promoting Iroquois art and artists, and a meeting place for all peoples to celebrate Iroquois culture and diversity.

As an anthropological institution, it is informed by research on archaeology, history, and the common creative spirit of modern artists and craftspeople.

The Museum presents a contemporary art exhibit with works by Iroquois artists each year in addition to permanent archaeology exhibits; a children's museum; a gift shop with items by Iroquois artists; a 45 acre nature park; and workshops, artist demonstrations, and festivals every summer.

Formed in 1981, the museum has seven employees, who kept going in 2020 despite the challenges of COVID

"Although the Museum was closed due to COVID, we were busy in 2020 offering virtual and outdoor activities for people to engage with Iroquois culture," said Director Stephanie Shultes.

"We presented a Facebook Live video series of artists demonstrations and mini-lessons on topics such as women's roles in Iroquois culture, quillwork, and hide tanning

All the videos are available on the museum's YouTube page.

For in-person visitors, the museum created an outdoor exhibit on Native stereotypes over the summer in its amphitheater and there was an increase in visits to its 45acre nature park with four trails.

'Additionally, we presented a virtual art opening discussion with artists represented in our 2021 exhibit "Identity/Identify" and started offering virtual field trips for school groups and adults from all over the Northeast to learn about the Iroquois," said Ms. Shultes.

The museum also welcomed a new communications manager, Cassandra Miller.

The Museum is looking forward to opening in April to welcome inperson visitors to experience the archaeology exhibits, children's museum, and 2021 contemporary art exhibit "Identity/Identify, which asks who is considered Iroquois and who gets to decide.

Most weekends this summer, the Museum will host artist demonstrations, workshops, dancing groups, and other special events like the Labor Day Weekend Festival.

A group of archaeologists, museum professionals, and Iroquois consultants have started meeting to re-imagine the Museum's extensive archaeology collection for a 21st century audience.

For those who want to experience the Museum and Iroquois culture remotely, the Museum has started creating virtual tours that will be available on the Museum's

website and include topics such as the Creation Story, oral history and storytelling, Iroquois and the Natural World, and more.

The tours are made possible by a grant from the Institute of Museum and Library Services.



## Community benefits from SCCAP

Schoharie County Community Action Program's (SCCAP) mission of building stronger, healthier communities and empowering families that experience economic and social challenges has never been more meaningful and important to meeting the needs of the community.

The year of 2020 presented many challenges to the health and wellbeing of staff, families served and the community at large due to the pandemic.

SCCAP rose to the challenge by rapidly establishing procedures conforming to NYS Forward guidelines to ensure there would be no interruption to client services and that they would be delivered in the safest way possible.

The agency received CARES Act funding to assist essential workers with child care expenses and day care providers with PPE supplies and facility enhancements for safe operations.

The agency's federal emergency assistance funding was also increased to address food insecurity and other stabilization services for those COVID impacted.

Knowing the pandemic will have long-term effects on the needs of those we serve, continued donor generosity is helping to assure SCCAP will have adequate resources to address these impacts in the days ahead.

SCCAP currently hosts seven departments of focus:

Child Care Resource & Referral provides free referrals to licensed and registered child care providers in Schoharie County, provides information to parents/guardians on how to choose a quality child care provider and information on child care financial assistance.

Staff also oversee youth development services through the Creative Connections for Youth mentoring and camp scholarship programs.

Community Services provides for situations requiring emergency assistance.

The SCCAP food pantry is also under the Community Services umbrella as well as the processing of HEAP applications and VITA tax return preparation.

Employment Training Center administers the New York State Displaced Homemaker Program (DHP) which offers services including career pathway development and counseling, help applying for jobs with interview preparation, resume and cover letter writing, and job search strategies, readiness and referrals.

Computer workshops are also currently held for Microsoft Office program and accounting software. The Center also offers workshops to area employers to assist with emplovee development needs.

Energy Services administers the Weatherization Assistance Program (WAP) which provides services to assist qualified, income-eligible residents of Schoharie County save on fuel and energy consumption.

An energy auditor visits the homes and provides a list of the measures that may be addressed, such as air infiltration/exfiltration. indoor air quality tests, insulation, ventilation, refrigerator testing and/ or replacement, window and door replacement for mobile homes, amongst other measures. Energy audits are also available to local homeowners on a fee-for-service basis.

Family Support and Resource Center provides a range of assistance to individuals and families: education, training, and resources through skill building; peer support and advocacy for families; anger management curriculum and Family Team Conferencing.

provides nutrition assistance through the USDA Supplemental Nutrition Program for Women, Infants and Children (WIC).

Qualifying individuals have access to farmers' market vouchers, breastfeeding peer counselors, nutrition and health education and free lead screenings by the Schoharie County Department of Health. Breastfeeding support groups are also free for all Schoharie County residents.

Parent and Child Connection Center offers supervised visitation services for non-custodial parents and children to maintain parent and child bonds, as well as cooperative parenting classes.

SCCAP was established in 1965 to promote self-sufficiency for those of limited income, ensuring that all residents are able to live in dignity by implementing innovative and cost-effective programs to improve the lives and conditions of the disadvantaged; by proving support and advocacy for those in need of assistance; and by being a major voice of reason in established welfare system reforms.

# SEEC puts our economy 1st

One year ago, SEEC aimed to lift the local economy and set Schoharie County up for a prosperous future.

Six months after SEEC appeared on the scene, the pandemic took hold and governments nationwide mandated business closures, shutting down the New York State economy.

2020 became a whirlwind of uncertainty.

Yet, one thing remained steady: SEEC's mission to foster economic growth

SEEC proved to be flexible in 2020.

As such, progress was made. SEEC focused on business retention and strengthening the local Economic Alliance.

SEEC helped local businesses navigate the pandemic by launching a loan program and gifting grants, channeling credible information, brokering relief programs and coordinating a local alliance to better serve the business community.

The alliance deployed surveys, developed local resource materials, co-hosted Recovery Roundtables, organized a Business Task Force and sponsored the SchoCo Promise, a program emphasizing the importance of safety protocols for the community to stay healthy and keep businesses open.

Now, moving further into 2021 and striving to restore normalcy, SEEC is broadening business retention and expansion initiatives, introducing new talent and industry attraction efforts, and continuing to facilitate targeted value-add investments.

"While federal relief programs might have helped a good portion of our local businesses in the short term, SEEC realizes there are still businesses that slipped through the cracks. Since launching our Resiliency Fund, businesses now have access to capital necessary for this important stage of the recovery process," said Tom Putnam, founder and executive chairman Fenimore Asset Management and SEEC founding member.

The SEEC Resiliency Fund, through local donations, received another allocation of capital and will continue into 2021.

SEEC was able to swiftly raise \$100,000 to award loans and grants to local businesses.

More than 26 businesses were assisted and \$75,000 was committed in 2020.

Another \$25,000 is available now for local organizations to make adaptations in response to the on-going public health crisis.

The Resiliency Fund proved to be a life-line to many businesses in Schoharie County.

For example, a Resiliency grant awarded to J Lacy Salon allowed owner Leslie Price to complete renovations so she could offer additional services

Power-Up Fitness owners, Travis Hyer and Donna Pesta, used their SEEC Resiliency funds to cover the cost of an air purification system, hands-free sanitizer stations, cleaning supplies and HVAC inspection and filters, all newly legislated requirements to re-open their gym.

Two dozen other organizations have similar stories and appreciation for receiving their Resiliency Fund awards.

SEEC actively assists local governments make targeted value add investments, too.

SEEC secured a grant that the Town of Summit sponsored to help Sauvage Beverages buy new equipment and post four new jobs during the pandemic.

SEEC is also mobilizing matching community investments into Main Street revitalization.

SEEC has submitted an Appalachian Regional Commission grant application in direct response to the COVID crisis and long-debated need to support Schoharie County agriculture.

The grant would underwrite a business plan that will introduce a state-of-the-art, profitable, regional independent food processing center intended to bolster local agproduction and shorten the food supply chain.

SEEC is also competing in the EDA SPRINT Challenge, a \$25 million national competition funded by the CARES Act known as Scaling Pandemic Resilience Through Innovation and Technology (SPRINT).

If funded, SEEC has proposed a project that would establish a Resiliency Innovation Zone for Entrepreneurs to address the economic, health, and safety risks caused by coronavirus pandemic the through entrepreneurship and innovation.

SEEC is making other strategic investments to attract freelancers to the community, recruiting those individuals fleeing more densely populated urban areas by asking them to live in Schoharie County vear-round.

SEEC is coordinating the launch of the Schoharie County Eagle Trail, a unique economic development initiative to boost tourism activity in 2021.

SEEC is also working with been resilient, extraordinarily so, Schoharie County leadership to craft "community benefit incentives" that will present unique negotiating power soliciting enterprise relocation and meant to reward job creation in the community.

In 2021, SEEC will continue to host forums and steer enterprise leaders to the Small Business Development Center for free mentorship and professional development training.

"These resources can teach us how to fully leverage technical platforms to better reach customers, facilitate greater efficiencies and tap new markets," said Paul Conroy, SEEC advisor.

Fostering economic growth is not SEEC's job alone.

SEEC asks consumers to remain 'hyper-local.'
